### PRODUCERS' NOTE

The last 5 months have truly been unprecedented in our history. Not only are we feeling the impact of a global pandemic, a major economic downturn, and seeing a renewed amplification of the centuries-long fight for racial justice, but we are also experiencing how technology has altered the way we work, live, and form human connections. In the midst of all of this, theater professionals – whose work typically depends on the very opposite of social distancing – have been hugely impacted, as their work, at least in its traditional form, largely cannot take place. More than just being out of work, the question many are asking is: What does it mean to practice, or sustain, our craft during this time?

We found ourselves facing this crisis right as we were set to begin our 10th anniversary season...right before our 4th annual 48Hours in...™ El Bronx was scheduled to take place in early April, which we had to cancel. We subsequently had to postpone our 2nd iteration of 48Hours in...™ Detroit, which was to take place this past July. As we thought about the 10th edition of our seminal Harlem event, we faced a tough decision. Ultimately, intrigued by the possibilities offered by the technology of this new reality, and especially by a deep desire to present our long-time community of both artists and audiences something special for our 10th anniversary, we decided to produce 48Hours in...™ Harlem Digital Edition. For our special 10th Harlem offering, we decide to return to our beginnings and use the 6 plays we had in our first ever 48Hours in...™ as source material for 6 different playwrights to create fresh takes on these African-American classics.

As the current news cycles reveal, the challenging issues facing Black lives in this country have been present since its founding. And throughout the years, it is us sharing our experiences with each other, telling our tales of love, sacrifice, despair, triumph, and joy...it is through genuinely seeing each other, that we have survived, and thrived. Black stories matter. And this year our artists created stories that speak to today, yesterday and tomorrow, with conversations across generations about love, authenticity, revolution, and possible futures. Thank you for joining us. We altered our typical 48 hour process to account for creating for the screen. So instead of the process happening over a weekend, it was broken into 48 hour chunks. The playwrights, directors and actors met for the first time at our meet and greet and were randomly assigned into 6 companies. The playwrights then had 48 hours to write a new 10-minute piece inspired by a classic black play. And after that the directors and actors had 48 hours to rehearse and shoot the 6 new works that are being presented this evening.


