PRODUCERS' CORNER

Welcome to the 5th annual **48Hours In... Harlem!** Wow. Five years. To be honest, we knew we were on to something when we birthed **Harlem9** and **48Hours In... Harlem**. Our gathering and deciding to produce together was a reflection of the larger resurgence of Black theater in NYC, the new renaissance in Harlem, and the many, many super talented black theater professionals we knew. However, we had no way of foreseeing: five years of sold out performances (including tonight); an Obie award; a prize winning play; numerous accolades; several invitations; and continuing expressions of gratitude for our work.

We remain honored and humbled to be at the helm of it all, supporting our artists as they do their craft. And, as Harlem9, what we've also come to appreciate deeply is the power of collaboration. We come from various backgrounds and histories in theater, yet we have found that our focus on respect for the artists, our shared love of Black people and culture, and our passion for seeing our stories told by our voices has continually drawn us together to create something larger than ourselves.

So we say again, thank you for joining us. And now, those magic words you may, by now, know well (and for those of you experiencing this special evening for the first time, in a nutshell): we chose 6 iconic Black plays, selected because of their provocative nature and commentary on "blackness." Our meet and greet for the artists was Friday from 7 – 9, at which we randomly composed 6 companies, each consisting of 1 playwright, 1 director and 3 actors. We then randomly assigned a play to each company, and asked our playwrights to write a new play inspired by these works in a 10-minute format, making their own provocative statements. At 9pm the work began. From 9pm to 5am, the playwrights wrote their new works. On Saturday, the 6 companies rehearsed. Earlier today, they met with the tech crew, and now, at 7pm, we're left with 2 hours and counting.
